

Have you ever had someone tell you they're praying for you or ask if they can pray for you? How did you feel in response? Similarly, have you ever offered to pray for someone, and how did they react? This kind of offer is rarely met with resistance; often, it brings comfort and reassurance. When someone offers to pray for you, it demonstrates a deep concern for your well-being and a desire to support you through challenging times. Personally, knowing that someone is praying for me or a loved one has been a source of significant relief, as if the burden is being shared.

• While it's often easy for us to pray for ourselves, our partners, our children, and other close family members, have you considered the importance of praying for others and how this practice can positively impact both them and you?

Take, for instance, the story of Job. He endured profound suffering, yet his situation began to improve when he prayed for his friends. In Job 42:10, it says, "And the Lord restored Job's losses when he prayed for his friends" (NKJV). This passage highlights that Job's fortunes were restored as a result of his intercessory prayer. It's important to understand that this does not imply that intercessory prayer will always lead to material gain. The broader context of Job's story reveals that suffering is not necessarily a sign of divine displeasure or a direct consequence of personal failings. Rather, Job's experience underscores the value that God places on those who extend grace and prayer towards others, even those who may have wronged them.

Jesus emphasises this principle in Luke 6:27-28: "But I say to you who hear: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, and pray for those who

spitefully use you" (NKJV). This teaching challenges us to rise above personal grievances and focus on the well-being of others, even those who may not treat us kindly. Similarly, James 5:16 advises, "Confess your trespasses to one another, and pray for one another, that you may be healed" (NKJV). This guidance reflects a broader spiritual truth: intercessory prayer can lead to healing and restoration, not only for those being prayed for but also for the one who prays.

Why is there such emphasis on praying for others? Engaging in intercessory prayer can be transformative. It shifts our focus from our own struggles to the needs of others, fostering empathy and compassion. This practice of prayer can help us grow spiritually and emotionally as we extend our care and support beyond ourselves.

Consider how this applies to your daily life. Do you pray for the student who disrupts your class, or the colleague dealing with a serious health issue? What about the parents facing

challenges in their marriage? Even in these everyday situations, the act of praying for others can create a ripple effect of kindness and understanding.

Jesus Himself exemplified this principle. As stated in Mark 10:45, "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many" (NKJV). His focus was always on others, and it remains so today.

Macquarie College

Macquarie College recently enjoyed its annual Junior School FLAG Week (Fun Learning About God) program, following which 117 enthusiastic Year 5 and 6 students embarked on a journey of Bible study.

The FLAG Week follow-up Bible study program, deeply rooted in MC's aspiration to be an exemplar of Adventist mission in an educational context, is led by a dedicated team from MC, including chaplains, teachers and principals, who together with local Adventist pastors and lay people ensure that each of the 117 young people now have the opportunity to be part of a small, peerbased Bible study group. One such group, led by an MC principal, consists entirely of young Muslim boys who are seeking a deeper understanding of Jesus.

This year's FLAG Week, titled - Jesus' Love for Me is Out of This World, saw students engaged in an interactive space-themed worship

program which included a message each day from Astronaut Ash (Pastor Ashley Smith) designed to deepen students' understanding of Christ as their personal Saviour and ever-consistent Friend.

The FLAG Week program, which combines spiritual teaching and worship of Christ with intentional time for educational content which supports the authenticity of scripture, such as the Word of the Day delivered by Rocket Man or Girl (various staff), aims to make the Bible relevant and accessible to young minds. The resulting Bible studies highlight the importance of intentional collaboration between Adventist school and community in nurturing the faith journey of MC students.
