

Some things just seem to go well together. Contrary to popular belief, pineapple goes great on pizza, summer and cricket are a perfect match, and camping isn't camping without a fire. These combinations don't just work—they become great when coupled together.

Often, we separate what God never intended us to separate. Ellen G. White, in the book Education, states:

This profound statement clearly demonstrates that education and redemption belong together. They are complementary, not competing, interests. In other words, the 'highest' education is the education that seeks to redeem. It doesn't have a spiritual program as one of many programs; rather, the spiritual program is the substance of its entire framework. Education, in its truest sense, is redemptive.

Insisting that redemption be the key purpose of Adventist education is not to the detriment of academic advancement. Redemption is elevating in nature; it strengthens the learning experience rather than weakens it. Redemption educates the whole person. It transforms the heart, cultivates the character, and expands the intellect. Such an education makes the academic soil far more fertile. This is why Adventist education is founded upon and furthered by redemption.

When education and redemption are one, it communicates that Jesus is invited on campus. This is because redemption, by nature, is the domain of the Redeemer. We cannot redeem; that is His specialty. We are merely instruments in His hand in this great enterprise. Therefore, when redemption is the central pillar of Adventist education, it places Jesus in His

rightful position within our educational model. Ellen White rightly states:

In the Teacher sent from God, all trueeducational work finds its center. (ED 83)

Our methodology is more than dry theory. It is relational, and because it is relational, it is transformational. True education is not merely the education of the mind; it is also the restoration of the heart. We invite our students to know Jesus for themselves, to meet the Jesus we have met, and to live for Him as we live for Him. It is to invite them not only to experience His goodness as Saviour but also to give their lives, abilities, and time for His service. This is what makes Adventist education an education of a lifetime, where the ripples of one's influence can only be measured in eternity.

Some things just seem to go well together, and perhaps the best of these things are education and redemption. There will
