

n a world filled with constant noise, tuning in to God's voice can feel like an impossible task. The pressures of work, the demands of family, and the endless stream of notifications and emails create a cluttered mental space, drowning out the still, small voice of God. We often wonder why we struggle to discern His guidance, yet we rarely pause to consider what might be causing the interference.

This was the theme presented by the Year 12 class at Avondale School's Week of Worship this term—'Tune In'. The students preached and shared testimonies as they encouraged their peers to tune in to God's presence in their lives. As I listened to their message, it reminded me of a profound illustration from Mark Batterson's book Whisper.

Dr Alfred Tomatis, a renowned ear specialist, once worked with an opera singer who had mysteriously lost the ability to sing certain notes in the higher frequencies. After extensive testing, he discovered that the issue was not with the singer's vocal cords, but with her hearing. Over an extended period of time, she had become deafened by the sheer volume of her own voice, making it impossible to reproduce sounds she could no longer hear. This phenomenon, now known as the Tomatis Effect, has significant spiritual implications. ▲ Like the singer, we can become deaf to God's voice—not because He isn't speaking, but because our own thoughts, ambitions and distractions create white noise or 'spiritual deafness' making it harder to hear the gentle promptings of the Holy Spirit.

Yet, just as Dr Tomatis discovered that hearing can be retrained, so too can our hearts. When we intentionally carve out time for prayer, stillness, and Scripture, we create space for God to speak. In Whisper, Mark Batterson highlights one of the most powerful prayers we can pray: "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening" (1 Samuel 3:9).

May we learn to silence the noise, lean into His presence, and attune our hearts to the divine melody of His voice.




MRS BRIELLE MCCURLEY [THE HEIGHTS LEARNING COMMUNITY]
